The Handley Neighborhood Association met on Monday, February 8, 2010 at the Handley United Methodist Church. President Joann Ehlers called the meeting to order at 7:00pm. Will Dryden gave the opening prayer.

The minutes were read and approved as read. The Treasurer's report was also read and approved.

The following announcements were made by President Joann Ehlers:

There will be a garage sale sometime in March. It will be held at the Gazebo on Handley Dr.

Will need help in pricing and getting items ready.

Alice Boyd, President of Ryanwood Neighborhood Assoc. said they would like to contribute funds to help build the fence around the cemetery.

Thanked those who helped set up for meeting. Signup sheets for setting up and clean up are now on table.

Cowtown Cleanup will be in April.

A suggestion presented by Marti Lawrence to contact all the churches in HNA area to have a representative to invite people to HNA meetings.

NPO Kim Gardener presented crime report. During week of Jan. 23-29, 2010, one burglary of a residence and five burglaries of vehicles occurred. Week of Jan. 30 thru Feb. 5, there were eight offenses but no residential burglaries.

The following announcements were made:

S.A.L.T. (Senior and Law Enforcement Together) Conference, Friday, March 5, 2010, 9am-2pm, at First United Methodist Church, Hurst. Please register no later than Feb. 28, 2010 as seating limited to 500. There will be free breakfast and lunch.

Personal situational Awareness training for women, Tuesday March 2, 2010, will be presented by Officer Rick Benson with Fort Worth PD Special Victim Section and Sex Crimes Unit.

Code Blue members remember to go to the academy to have your photo taken by Officer Perez for code Blue Seminar, May 22. If you can't make it to the academy you will be able to have your picture taken during the Captain's meeting on February 22, 2010. Please do not wear green.

Code compliance Officer Dennis Mitchell introduced Tony Wypij, new code enforcement Officer for East Neighborhood Code District. Code Rangers meeting will be around Feb. 27th.

Betty Coomer, of Code Compliance reported that more volunteers are needed to patrol the area. A lot of burglaries of vehicles are occurring. Halbert Street is being worked on as well as the street by the fire station causing people to have to park elsewhere. More patrolling is needed in those areas.

The HNA speaker for the evening was Captain Gene Jones of the Police Department East Division. Captain Jones has been in law enforcement for 23 years and has been Captain for 3 years. He was happy to be assigned to the Eastside, although it is the most challenging area to work. Capt. Jones lists three ac-

complishments he hopes to meet: 1. Reducing crime, 2. Build new relationships in area by bringing new people in, 3. Strengthen relationships by being visible at public events. When he leaves, he wants to look back to see revitalization and improvements.

In the last four months, he has developed new programs such as the Neighborhood Service Walks where officers get out of their cars and walk the neighborhood to introduce themselves. 2010 is Crime Watch year and he encourages everyone to join. Patrol shifts have been changed by overlapping shifts during the peak crime periods. Have a strike team to increase traffic stops. A lot of burglaries are caught thru traffic stops. The number of NPO's has been increased to 15. Woodhaven is the number one crime area with second being the Eastchase Apartment area. When he came to the Eastside the main problem was residential burglaries and now has seen a reduction in them. Shoplifting is up significantly with the majority of them being arrested. Aggravated assaults have also increased. Robberies are attributed to the CVS area on Meadowbrook due to two apartment complexes being nearby. Bringing uniformed officers to area will help but resources are limited. Capt. Jones stated overall, crime is trending downward and will continue to work to get it down.

President Joan Ehlers invited everyone to attend the Citizens Advisory Committee on the first Monday of the month at 6:00pm at Handley Meadowbrook Community Center to keep informed with what is going on in neighborhood.

Betty Coomer announced that dues for 2010 are due.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 pm.

THE HANDLEY NEWS

Continued from the February 2010 Newsletter:

By 1904, the Interurban seemed fully established—a cinderless, smokeless wonder. The line operated from Dallas to Fort Worth and South to Cleburne. The main plant to supply power was located here on what was then Lake Erie, and a substation was in Joshua. The Texas Electric Power Plant now covers this area and the cooling pond is the original Lake Erie. Stories abound of the picnic grounds, and a resort like area built around the lake, swings and a Merry Go Round, hot air balloon ascensions, a skating rink, canoeing and this interesting bit—a kind of pulley that pulled your canoe atop Turkey Knob. Perhaps your descent was some what like our popular Log Ride at Six Flags. A pavilion was built on piers to extend out over the lake. It was two stories high, requiring three flights of stairs. There was a stage 20 x 100 feet and a dance floor said to have attracted the best of music participants. No rough housing was allowed. One gentleman told of learning to swim, going from pier to pier. He too told us of the tie yard located across the road from the park. It was his delight at about age 6 to chase rabbits in and by closing up one end as the animal would scurry into the first possible opening; he was able to trap them. The pavilion burned.

The interurban operated from 1901 until 1934. Speeds of 80 miles per hour were achieved at Chalk Hill. The cars were very plush and even had swivel seats. One of the most luxurious of the cars was known as the Crimson Limited. Stops from Fort Worth to Dallas were Cleburne Junction (located at Riverside and East Lancaster), Sycamore Heights, Sycamore Creek, College Hill (TWC), Tandy Lake, Oakland, Sagamore Hill, Stop Six, Haynes, Durringer, Point Breeze (now Tierney Rd.), Canton Dr., Handley Dr., East Handley, Oakridge (the farms that included the now Rose Hill Cemetery), Bethel, Waples, Cloverdale, Siding Eleven, Fruitvale, Bower, and Keystone, which was the infamous death crossing. Six people were killed in a covered wagon accident here in 1913. The next stop was Summit and then Arlington. One wonders just how long the trip took if all stops were made!

Now that we have Handley established, let us go back in 1876, the year of the coming of the Railroad. About this time we find a church being built known as the Union Church, used by the Methodists two Sundays a month, the Baptists one Sunday and the Presbyterians one Sunday. One wonders if on the fifth Sundays there was not an all day singing and dinner on the grounds.

The Tidball family donated land for the cemetery, a Public Burial Ground, called the Old Handley Cemetery. This is the small one you see by the Power Plant. Much of the time this is an eyesore. One man said he moved to Fort Worth in 1899 and it had always been over grown with weeds as long as he could remember. Periodically some civic minded group will go in and clean it up, as a Boy Scout Troup did last year, but this is a much needed project that needs to be tended to on a regular basis. Ophelia White, recently retired principal of East Handley, whose father was the chief engineer of the Power Plant in the early 1900's, tells us that her mother would organize cemetery workings each spring, furnishing tools and ice water.

Few know of another cemetery, located a few hundred yards eastward. This was for the Blacks and they too had their church known as Ebenezer Baptist Church. The burial ground is in sad shape, many stones toppling and some broken and untended. You can see this cemetery, if you look quickly as you are passing the Wright's green house and coming into Handley from Arlington. It cannot be seen in summer when leaves and grass are green.

The need for schools too came and in 1877 in the summer, a small building was built to be ready for fall opening. It was located on the corner of Daggett (now Forest)) and Main (now Hart) south of the T&P tracks. Mr. J. C. Cannifax was in charge. He too served as the Methodist minister receiving 25cents a Sunday for his services. One wonders how many students he had and his salary there.

By 1895, the need for new and larger school led to the erection of a building at the corner of Forest and Church Streets. It had two rooms that could be divided or put together by the raising or lowering of a partition. A part of this building is said still to exist next to the old Masonic Lodge Building.

The third school building was completed in 1910. It was opened by Superintendent H.G. Read and Mr. Robert L. Huff. This building, constructed of red brick and trimmed with white stone, was located at 3127 Chilton Street. It had a half basement and two other stories, and the campus covered about four acres of land. By 1922 extensive remodeling was done.
